

Water Donation to Myanmar

The Boon Rawd Brewery sent a troop of 20 trucks to deliver 20,000 drinking water packs to the Burmese victims through Air Vice Marshal Choocheep Phewsomboon, Director-General of Air Force Civil Affairs Department, the Royal Thai Air Force, who is also acting as Secretary of Disaster Relief Center of the Royal Thai Air Force. The hand-over ceremony was held on May 8, 2008 at Don Muang Air Force Base.

These drinking water packs were loaded on a C-130 air force plane, which flew from Bangkok to Rangoon, and distributed to survivors in the affected areas."
